Since January 2025, ROSP provides this service to 50 families on permanent basis and several hundred on ad hoc basis. The demand for this service is increasing day by day as parents are not able to manage their disabled children.

Large number of individuals are volunteering and getting registered for outdoor services like going to hospital, shopping and family



ROSP is providing training services on attendant services for persons with disability in both in educational institutions and recreational places.

The outcome of this service is not only helping individuals earn their living but also to help, aid and assist PWD's in their daily life.

ROSP MOBILITY PROGRAM



Wheelchairs are perhaps the single most crucial thing for a person with any disability. Understanding the significance and sensitivity of wheelchair in a disabled person's life, ROSP designs special wheelchairs for every disability. The specificity of the wheelchairs helps a disabled person to carry all the daily life activities independently without relying on anyone else.

ROSP has a tradition of arranging and distributing wheelchairs. This wheelchair distribution is carried out annually during the holy month of Ramadan.

Over the 5 years, the organisation has been able to arrange and distribute around 600 wheelchairs. The distribution ceremony also provides ration to more than 300 disabled people. Along with that, the organisation has successfully distributed specially assembled bikes and an Auto Rickshaw for people with disabilities. These new beneficiaries are then further engaged in ROSP's self-sufficient program.



ROSP EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

ROSP's Employment Program offers assistance and support to individuals with disabilities seeking employment.

ROSP Employment Consultants provide skills assessment, computer testing, resume preparation, job development, networking opportunities, interviewing skills, on the job training, and career development.



With jobs starting from an achievable level, we can offer opportunities for young people from restrictive backgrounds with special needs.

We are equipped with short courses in numerous faculties, ranging from Finance and Accounting to Risk Management and Philanthropic studies.

Programme Model

Classroom Training

Our local implementing partners are responsible for delivering 100 hours of soft skills training for the students, focusing on English language, hospitality and life skills using our curriculum.

Hands-on Training

We work with member and non-member entities and related places of work to provide practical training. This training can be delivered across 2-4 months or extended where necessary.

Support to Find Employment

After completing the training, the trainees are supported to find employment in hospitality or related workplace.

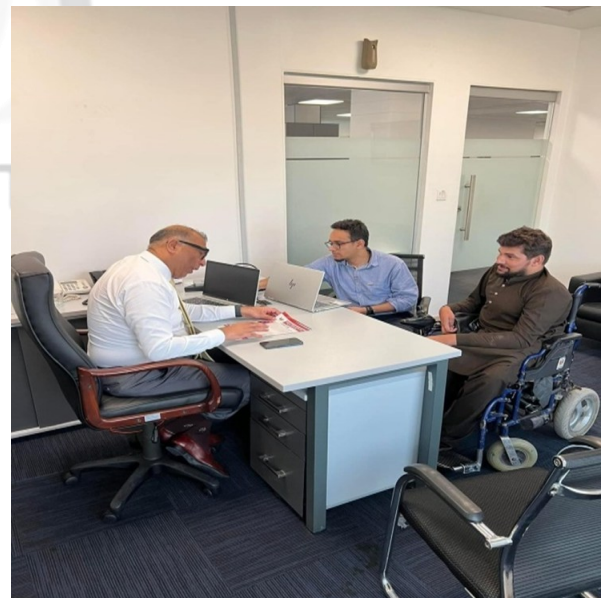

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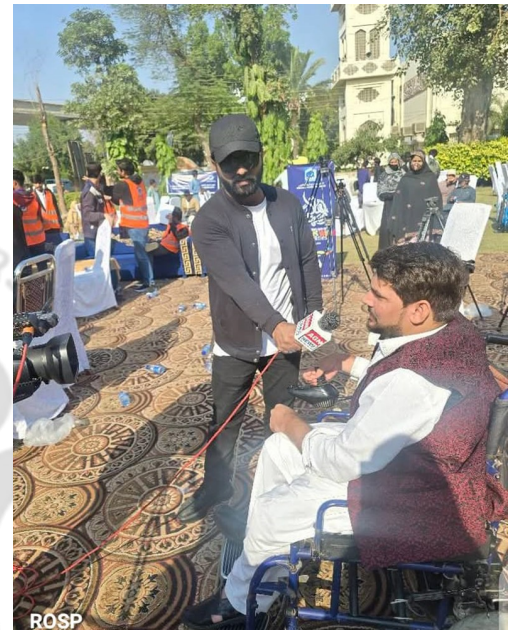
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MEDIA COVERAGE

1 LEGAL STATUS AND OPERATIONS

Rights of Special Persons Welfare Foundation has been duly registered under the Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (Registration & Control) Ordinance, 1961 (XLVI OF 1961) dated 25th April 2017. The foundation is currently involved in the welfare of disabled person. The registered office of the foundation is situated at 12-A Canal Bank Extension Mughalpur, Lahore.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan. The accounting standards applicable in Pakistan comprise of:

- International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) notified under the Companies Act, 2017; and
- Provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

Where provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 differ from the IFRS Standards, the provisions and directives under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

2.2 BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

3 MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

3.1 Property and equipment's

These are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any identified impairment loss. Depreciation is charged using reducing balance method, so as to write-off the historical cost of an asset over its estimate useful life at the rates specified in the relevant Note 4.

Full year depreciation is charged during the year in which the asset is acquired, while no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. Impairment loss or its reversal, if any, is also charged to income. When an impairment loss is recognized, the depreciation charge is adjusted in the future periods to allocate the asset's revised carrying amount over its estimated remaining useful life.

An assets carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Maintenance and normal repairs are charged to income and expenditure account as and when incurred.

Gain or loss on disposal of asset is represented by the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognized as income or expense.

3.2 Revenue recognition

Donations, profit on debt and sale of books are recorded on receipt basis.

3.3 Cash and bank balances

Cash and cash equivalents comprise of cash in hand and cash at bank.

3.4 Accrued expenses and other liabilities

Liabilities for accrued expenses and other payables are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the Institute.
